Did you know? – Some scary statistics about the dangers online:

There is estimated to be over
5,000,000 predators that surf the
internet.

One in five kids have been sexually solicited online.

75% of youth who received an online sexual solicitation did not tell a parent.

64% of the teens surveyed admitted they did things online that they would not want their parents to know about.

“ Statistics vary, but at least 20 percent of kids will receive harassing, hateful, or insulting messages. ”

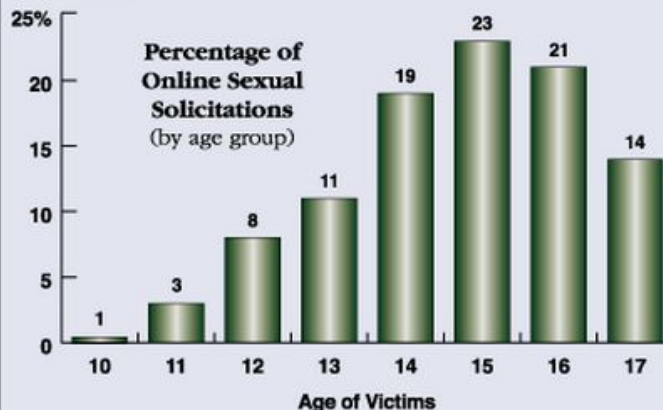


- **86%** of CHILDREN can chat online without their parents' knowledge.
- **64%** of TEENS do things online they don't want their parents to know about.
- **50%** of TEENS communicate online with someone they have never met.
- **30%** of TEENAGED GIRLS are sexually solicited inside a chat room.
- **58%** of PARENTS monitor what their child does in online chat rooms.

Most Victims Are Over Age 13

More than three-quarters of the youths targeted by cyber-predators are over 13; the most incidents are reported by 15-year-olds. While younger Internet users had fewer solicitations, researchers say they have a harder time dealing with such incidents.
